



## A Pastoral Letter from Fr. Gary Paul Lambert

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Earlier in the month of September, I wrote a letter to the members of the Vestry, the Transition Team, and the Search Committee. I would like to share the thrust of that letter with you, because its content is important for all of us in these final days of transition. One of the hallmarks of a time of transition is the change being made along the way. Much of our change at St. Matthew's has been in the line of the renewal of ministries and activities. We are not re-inventing the wheel. However, when it seems important to move into some new areas, it is only done after considered deliberation.

I am very delighted at the number of leaders in your parish who have stood up to be involved in the engagement of developing and re-developing. You are very blessed, indeed, with people who are trying to put the nuts and bolts together of a renewed vision for St. Matthew's. At the same time, with so much activity going on things not only appear a bit chaotic; things are chaotic. The chaos you may witness at this moment in time is a sign of the order yet to come. Anglicans pride themselves with doing ministry in good order. However, before order, there is first chaos. So do not worry, things are not falling apart. What you are witnessing are great signs of health and vitality. As a matter of fact, if you would like to know more about some of the things taking place your voluntary participation is invited and welcome.

There are changes in the administration of the parish taking place, too. Since Franklin Gail has retired, we have hired Abigail Wincek to serve as Parish Administrator. Abigail brings many gifts to the table and we are very happy to have her with us. Faced with so much energy and activity I have found it necessary to initiate a protocol of sorts in order to be as organized and focused as possible. The following two paragraphs are the same ones I wrote to some of our parish leaders:

The fundamental exercise of this protocol is to be as communicative as possible with people who need to know about projects, activities, information gathering and decision to be made. If you think someone might have some related interest and/or need to know, then, please inform this person. Since I am the rector, I have the unique advantage to be able to observe the overall parish in ways no one else can. Therefore, I should be on everyone's communication list. There have been times when I have learned of some actions second hand or late in the day and would have given some important input had I known earlier. Secondly, there needs to be one person who can help tie things together, provide resources, and keep a finger on the pulse of the parish in order to supply feedback that might be helpful. Please, keep each other, and me, informed about the process of things with which you are working.

Another responsibility I have is the oversight of the parish staff. Abigail, Mary and Jeff work for the parish, but they are responsible to me. If there is a need to employ one of our staff for a project of some sort there usually is no problem with this kind of request. However, I do want to know about it. Each of our staff members works well on an independent basis and they are here to serve the parish. Having one chain of authority, though, will avoid working at cross purposes and will make things less confusing for staff members.

There is a familiar story that made the rounds a few years back. It seems there was a much beloved elderly woman who had been a member of the parish for many decades. When she died her family and friends began to make arrangements for her funeral. In her personal papers they found what seemed to be a very strange instruction. She had directed that when she was laid in her coffin a fork was to be placed in her hand. "Why would anyone do such a thing like that," people wondered? Reading on in her instructions her sister came across an explanation. This woman had loved the church pot luck dinners and did her best to never miss these events. When the servers would gather the dinner plates and dishes from the table after the main course, they reminded everyone to save their forks for dessert, "For the best is yet to come." Therefore when I die I want to meet my Lord with a fork in my hand, because I know the best is yet to come.

So in these waning days of transition let us pray for patience and kindness towards one another. And, please remember your forks --- because the best is yet to come.

### **Ministry of the Month: Soup Kitchen**

During the thirty years of our participation in the work of the Soup Kitchen, we have served meals to at least 10,000 guests. In those thirty years, approximately 175 individuals have served as a St. Matthew's team member. We serve on the third Sunday of each month. To fulfill the tasks assigned to volunteers, we need a minimum of nine workers but the preferable number is eleven. Each team of volunteers is tasked to make the soup (and provide the produce, etc. for making the soup), make sandwiches, do the set up for fruit and dessert, and of course, serve the meal. Two team members arrive early (2 PM) in order to prepare the vegetables and get the soup started – sandwich makers/servers arrive at 3:30 PM. The usual departure time for volunteers is 5:30 PM.

Serving at the Soup Kitchen is one of the few outreach activities that offers direct contact with those being assisted. Serving food to those in need can be seen as a response to Our Lord's call to "feed His sheep" – a ministry that witnesses to Christ's presence in the life of our parish.


